Is Girish Karnad DU's distinguished alumnus?

NEW DELHI, March 27 The Delhi University seems to have landed itself into some trouble over its choice of persons to be given the "Distinguished Alumni Award" during the university's platinum jubilee year.

The list of nominees, recently forwarded by a special committee formed for the purpose, apparently contains the name of a person who never graduated from the university.

The list—which comprises the names of 14 eminent persons from India and abroad— also has the name of Dr Girish Karnad, eminent theatre and film personality and national award winner, who, said sources, never received any degree from the university and, therefore, cannot be considered an alumnus of the university.

Indications are that the issue would come up for deliberations and some dust would be raised on the matter during DU's next Executive Council meeting, scheduled to take place at the end of this month.

DU stalwarts, contacted by The Hindustan Times, expressed their outrage at the inclusion of Dr Karnad's name. One said: "There are so many other deserving persons who could have been named. Don't names of

eminent sportspersons like Mohinder Amarnath and Deepak Wadhwa, who was at one time ranked 33rd in badminton in the world, ring a bell?"

"In the international sphere," added another prominent member of the DU alumni, "Pakistan's former President, Gen. Zia-ul-Haq, too had been enrolled with the university at one time. Making him a nominee, even posthumously, would be a gesture which would have been well appreciated across the bor-

Delhi University's Registrar K. K. Panda, however, said: "The list is not final. It comprises the names of the persons who have been 'recommended' for the award by the Justice R. S. Pathak committee. We are checking up on the particulars of each and every nominee and only thereafter will we give a final list."

Another senior official at the university said that "some doubt" has arisen over whether Dr Karnad ever graduated from the university as its student. Meanwhile, he added that over 10 nominees of those shortlisted by the committee—including Dr Karnad — had already sent in their letters consenting to the acceptance of the award.

The other members shortlisted by the special committee include

Nobel laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, film artiste and producer Amitabh Bachchan, veteran Parliamentarian Indrajit Gupta, Urdu poet Ali Sardar Jafri, painter Anjolie Ela Menon, industrialist and philanthropist Bharat Ram, University of Penn's renowned statistician Prof C. R. Rao, Indira Gandhi National Centre for Arts Chairperson Dr Kapila Vatsyayan, Member of Parliament Meira Kumar, Union Finance Secretary Montek Singh Ahluwalia, classical dancer Shovana Narain, sarod maestro Sharan Rani Backliwal and former DU Vice-Chancellor Sarup

Other sources said: "Some people believe that Dr Karnad was, for a very short time, enrolled at St Stephen's College. But, so far, nothing has emerged to give any sort of certainty to that belief."

The recently appointed Dean of Alumni Affairs, Dr Sydney R. Rebeiro, himself a Stephanian, too acknowledged that there was some uncertainty over Dr Karnad being a member of the alumni.

"I have heard that Dr Karnad was enrolled in Stephen's College for some time, but I have not been able to verify it. Besides, Stephen's does not remember him."
